What are children's rights?




Children's rights are what you need to grow up happy, healthy and safe.



Children's rights are written in the United Nations

Convention on the Rights of the Child. This is called the UNCRC for short.

The **UNCRC** is an important agreement between lots of countries who have promised to protect children's rights.



Here are some of the rights in the UNCRC that you and everyone else under the age of 18 has:

- The right to be listened to
- The right to go to school
- The right to be able to play
- The right to be able to relax.

Every year, we write a **report** about children's rights in Scotland.

The Scottish Government wants to make the **UNCRC** part of **the law** in Scotland.

This will mean the Scottish

Government, public
authorities and other
organisations will need to
protect children's rights all of
the time.



Public authorities are organisations like:

- Schools
- Hospitals
- Local councils
- The police



Children will be able to complain to a **judge** if they think your rights are not being protected.




Scotland needs to **get ready** for this new law. We are writing a **report** about what needs to happen.

Protecting children's rights



Scottish Government, public authorities and other organisations will need to make sure children's rights are protected all of the time.

- **Supporting** you to have your voices heard.
- Training and information so everyone understands children's rights.
- Checking if you feel your rights are protected.
- Making sure there are easy ways for you to complain if things go wrong.
- Thinking about children's rights when making decisions.
