CHAIR'S REPORT

In another year of both challenge and progress for children's rights in Scotland, Together demonstrated unwavering determination in its mission to ensure every child growing up in Scotland has their rights respected, protected, and fulfilled. The strength of our efforts is a testament to the energy and passion of children, young people, and our members, who have navigated the complexities of this journey with resilience and dedication.

Special recognition is due to Safiyah and Oscar, two of our Rights Detectives, who played a leading role in informing the development of Scotland's proposed new Human Rights Bill. Their investigations, carried out with 185 children and young people, provided invaluable insights into their lived experiences of rights in Scotland. Their creative contributions, including the 'spider's web' analogy, formed the backbone of Together's evidence to Parliament on the reconsideration of the UNCRC Bill, helping to communicate complex issues in a way that was widely praised for its clarity and accessibility.

We are also deeply grateful to #TeamScotlandUN and members of the Children's Parliament and Scottish Youth Parliament, whose advocacy was central to informing MSPs during the scrutiny of the UNCRC Bill. Their voices have been instrumental in ensuring that children's rights remain at the forefront of legislative debate, and their efforts have helped to secure significant advances in Scotland's journey to fully realise children's human rights.

Looking ahead, we are excited by the opportunities that lie before us. With the launch of our new Strategic Plan 2024-32 and the invaluable support from Cattanach, we are poised to bring an even stronger focus on the rights of babies and early years children. This increased capacity will allow us to deepen our impact and ensure that the youngest children in Scotland are fully recognised in the ongoing implementation of children's rights.

Lastly, I would like to extend my heartfelt thanks to Together's Director, the dedicated staff team, and my fellow Trustees. Your unwavering commitment to children's rights has been the driving force behind our achievements this year, and I am confident that Together will continue to meet the challenges of the coming year with the same passion and determination.



About us

Together's vision is that all children growing up in Scotland have their human rights respected, protected and fulfilled.

Our journey began in 1996 when a group of children's organisations formed an informal alliance to promote children's human rights as set out in the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC).

Together has five core aims, as set out in our Strategic Plan 2019-24, which shape everything we do:



About us

Together relies on grants and membership payments to cover operating costs. Throughout 2023-24 we made progress towards our aims with a range of funding from Scottish Government, grant funders and our membership. We acknowledge the invaluable core funding received from the Scottish Government Children's Rights Unit and the Children and Young People Early Intervention Fund, as well as funding to support the Rights Detectives from the Scottish Government Human Rights Bill team. We especially thank Cattanach who gave project funding to enable Together to chair the Rights of the Child UK Coalition and to our members and supporters for their continued donations, fundraising and wider support.

This funding enabled Together to continue employing five full-time staff (Director, Legal & Policy Manager, Development Manager, Project Officer, Membership, Events and Communications Officer) and one part-time staff (Business Support Officer). It also enabled us to continue employing a part-time Policy and Communications Intern and to recruit a full time Policy Assistant from September 2023. Project funding from Scottish Government for the Rights Detectives enabled Together to continue engaging the services of a Participation Consultant.





What have children said about promoting child rights-focused law?

Incorporating the UNCRC

Together continued its passionate advocacy for incorporating children's UNCRC rights into Scots law. We partnered closely with members to build their capacity to engage in and influence the reconsideration of the UNCRC (Incorporation) (Scotland) Bill. Our Implementation Strategy Group (ISG) met four times, providing a vital platform for members to understand amendments and share their views. These insights helped shape our Director's oral evidence to the Equalities, Human Rights and Social Justice (EHRSJ) Committee and informed our joint letter to the Cabinet Secretary, supported by over 40 members.

"I'm definitely worried about what rights are going to be knocked back because of devolved governments law. I think the most terrifying part is adults don't even know what areas of the rights are going to be passed or what areas are going to be passed back."

Promoting child rightsfocused law

To achieve this, we will:

- Advocate for the full incorporation of the UNCRC and other international human rights standards into Scots and UK law.
- Identify where Scots law falls short of the standards enshrined in the UNCRC and advocate for legislation that meets and exceeds international human rights standards.
- Influence and inform new legislation brought forward by the Scottish and UK Government to ensure it meets international human rights standards.

What did we do?

Giving evidence on the UNCRC Bill

In October 2023, Together's Director provided evidence to the Scottish Parliament's Equalities, Human Rights & Social Justice Committee during the reconsideration of the UNCRC Bill. Using a creative analogy developed with the Rights Detectives, the Director presented the UNCRC Bill as a 'spider's web'—designed to catch and address breaches of children's rights. Although the amended Bill has some gaps, the Director emphasised that it still represents a vital step forward in Scotland's journey to fully realise children's rights. The session underscored that while the Bill is not without its limitations, it remains an essential tool for protecting children's rights and promoting a culture of rights awareness and respect.

The Director also highlighted the ongoing nature of this process, encouraging the Committee and the Scottish Government to view the Bill as a foundation that can be strengthened over time through collaborative efforts and clear communication with babies, children, young people, and families. This evidence was widely congratulated and well received, with many commending it as an exemplary approach to explaining complex legal issues in a manner that is accessible and easily understood. The analogy of the spider's web was particularly praised and was shared widely on social media, demonstrating how effective communication can bridge the gap between legal complexities and public understanding.



Supporting members' engagement

To ensure widespread understanding of complex legal developments, we produced plain language blogs and infographics, with three key publications during the UNCRC Bill's reconsideration stage. We also supported members in responding to various consultations, including developing a guide for the Human Rights Bill consultation and sharing an early draft of our response. Our MSP briefing ahead of the final UNCRC Bill debate on 7th December 2023 ensured that the voices of babies, children, young people were at the heart of the Scottish Parliament debate as MSPs unanimously passed the Bill.

Plain language resources

Together continued to provide regular plain language explanations of legal and policy developments. This has been particularly valuable around the reconsideration of the UNCRC Bill and the amendments needed to bring the Bill within the powers of the Scottish Parliament. Together produced numerous plain language blogs and infographics to distil key information, empowering our members to engage more effectively in advocating for children's rights and to better understand the implications of developments for their day-to-day practice.





Further work

- Supported members in responding to consultations on the Human Rights Bill, Care and Justice Bill, proposed Education Bill and proposed Restraint Bill.
- Coordinated video evidence from children and young people to inform the Equalities, Human Rights and Social Justice (EHRSJ) Committee's scrutiny of the reconsideration of the UNCRC Bill.
- Developed a briefing on the minimum age of marriage, demonstrating our commitment to addressing specific children's rights issues.

What have our members said?




72% of surveyed members agreed that Together had increased their awareness and understanding of children's rights and the UNCRC 'a lot', with the remaining 28% stating it had helped 'a bit'. This demonstrates Together's consistent effectiveness, as these results are very similar to the 2022 Membership Survey. Members particularly value Together's consultation response guides, with 100% of respondents rating them as extremely important (5 out of 5). This highlights the organisation's crucial role in supporting members to engage with policy developments.

Supporting child rights practice

What did we do?

Skills & Knowledge Framework

Together completed partnership work with Children's Parliament, Just Right Scotland, JRS KnowHow and the Observatory on Human Rights of Children at Swansea University on the Children's Rights Skills and Knowledge Framework and Training Plan. We submitted final versions to Scottish Government alongside over 40 new resources and a Learning Library that catalogued and tagged over 400 existing resources to support children's rights learning and training. Together has continued to work with Scottish Government to prepare for launching the Framework and Training Plan in two stages: a soft launch of all content as PDF and Word documents, followed by a full launch of all interactive digital elements.

Observatory on Children's Human Rights Scotland

As a co-founder, Together's Director has been instrumental in informing and shaping the strategy of the Observatory. Together's role on the Observatory has been pivotal in linking academia to civil society, ensuring that the Observatory's research and initiatives add real value to Together's members and the broader children's rights community. Through the establishment of a new Research Network on children's human rights, funded by the Royal Society of Edinburgh, Together is facilitating the sharing of interdisciplinary expertise between academics, policy-influencers, practitioners and babies, children and young people across Together's membership. This has not only enhanced the Observatory's impact but also strengthened the practical application of children's rights across Scotland, ensuring that the work of the Observatory is deeply connected to the needs and priorities of Together's members.





Human Rights Clinic

Together co-hosted a collaborative project with the LLM in Human Rights programme at the University of Edinburgh. As a co-facilitator of the Human Rights Clinic, Together's Director guided a group of five LLM students—Alexander Pedersen, Fiona Campbell, Isobel Mintz, Mariam Tavdgiridze, and Praise Ladringan—in conducting a research project focused on integrating children's rights into budgetary processes in Scotland. This intensive three-month research culminated in a comprehensive report that offers a robust framework to support Scotland's compliance with its upcoming obligations under the UNCRC Bill.

The Human Rights Clinic final report, which was launched in May 2023, provides ten key recommendations, drawing on both international and domestic examples of human rights budgeting. It has been recognised as an essential tool for turning the aspirations of the UNCRC Bill into a lived reality for babies, children and young people. The findings from this research have already informed Together's ongoing work in the area of children's rights budgeting, and contributed to the work of the Observatory of Children's Human Rights Scotland and the Improvement Service. The collaboration not only provided valuable insights but also demonstrated the impact that Together's partnerships with academic institutions can have in shaping real-world policy and practice.



What have we done?

Advisory boards and working groups

Throughout 2023-24, Together has been instrumental in advancing children's rights in Scotland through active participation in key advisory groups and boards. Our Director plays an active role on the UNCRC Strategic Implementation Board, the Human Rights Bill Advisory Board and the Scottish Education Council. Additionally, Together's Director co-chairs the Scottish Government Children's Rights in Justice Group alongside the Director of the Children and Young People's Centre for Justice. The wider staff team contribute to the UNCRC Implementation: Embedding in Public Services Group and the UNCRC Communications Network. Beyond government groups, we are also actively involved in the UNCRC Working Together Partnership and the Children's Sector Strategic Forum. These roles ensure that children's rights are central to discussions and decision-making processes across both governmental and non-governmental platforms.

Member induction and capacity building

Together continued to provide regular member induction workshops. These provide a platform for new members to deepen their understanding of children's rights and help drive practice and culture change within each of their organisations. The workshops also strengthen connections across the sector, helping to create a powerful shared voice advocating for children's rights.

Our 2023 membership survey showed that 50% of members felt Together had helped 'a lot' in developing their understanding of a rights-based approach, with the other 50% saying it had helped 'a bit'. 44% of members felt Together had supported them 'a lot' with implementing a rights-based approach, while 56% said it had helped 'a bit'.

The survey also revealed that members highly value child rights training, with 67% rating it as 'extremely important' (5 out of 5) and 33% rating it as 'very important' (4 out of 5). Child rights toolkits were also seen as crucial, with 33% rating them as 'extremely important' and 67% as 'very important'. It found that 83% of members found informal, conversational events on key children's rights areas to be beneficial. Additionally, 72% expressed interest in events exploring the UN Committee on the Rights of the Child's recommendations to the UK and Scottish Government. This demonstrates the value members place on Together's role in facilitating engagement with international human rights processes.

Further work

Together continues to build knowledge and capacity on children's rights through participating in a wide range of events, workshops and presentations. These have supported members to understand what a child rights-based approach looks like in a range of settings, from early childhood education to the child justice system.

Supporting children

What did we do?

#TeamScotlandUN and UN Committee review

Together played a crucial role in supporting children's participation in the UN Committee's 2023 review of the UK. In May 2023, we secured a further opportunity for children and young people from across Scotland (known as #TeamScotlandUN) and the wider UK to meet with UN Committee members during the UK review. This allowed for a more informal chance for children to discuss their priority issues and reflect on developments since their last meeting with the UN Committee in February. By creating spaces through which children, young people and UN Committee members could develop a trusting relationship and speak comfortably and confidently to each other, Together empowered #TeamScotlandUN and other children and young people from across the UK to advocate effectively for their rights. This was reflected by the extent to which the issues that children and young people spoke about were reflected in the Committee's Concluding Observations (or recommendations) to the UK, including community-based mental health support, exam stress and culture in schools and child poverty.

Rights Detectives project

Together continued to support the Rights Detectives project, empowering children aged 11-17 to shape proposals for Scotland's new Human Rights Bill. This innovative approach to children's participation allowed children and young people to conduct 'special missions', acting as peer-researchers to investigate what Scottish Government needs to know from children and young people to make sure the new Bill addresses their priorities.



Supporting children

State of Children's Rights Report 2024

We launched our ambitious State of Children's Rights Report 2024 project, which aims to tell the story of children's rights implementation through children's own words, artwork, and other means of expression. To date, we have conducted scoping interviews with 11 organisations, drafted resources (reviewed by members of the Children's Parliament), and recruited five organisations to work on a Development Phase, leading story-gathering sessions with children and young people aged 1 to 17.

#RightsOnTrack campaign

On World Children's Day 2023, we launched the #RightsOnTrack campaign to ensure Scottish Government and other duty bearers act on recommendations from the UN Committee on the Rights of the Child. We raised awareness through a child-friendly version of the recommendations, a social media campaign, and by hosting a parliamentary event featuring Professor Ann Skelton (Chair of the UN Committee), alongside children and young people, and the Minister for Children, Young People and Keeping the Promise.

As part of this ongoing campaign, Together collaborated with Members of Children's Parliament, Members of Scottish Youth Parliament, and the Children and Young People Commissioner Scotland's Young Advisors to create child-friendly versions of the UN Committee's concluding observations, ensuring that children and young people could understand and engage with these important recommendations.

What did we do?

Rights of the Child (UK) coalition

In January 2024, Together assumed the Chair of the Rights of the Child (UK) Coalition, supported by funding from Cattanach. This project unites children's rights alliances from across the UK and its crown dependencies, fostering mutual learning and coordinating joint advocacy efforts. As part of this initiative, we are planning an exciting UK-wide conference to be held in Edinburgh in autumn 2024.

International advocacy

We continued to engage in international advocacy, partnering with Scottish Women's Aid to submit a joint letter to the UN Special Rapporteur on violence against women and girls. This letter addressed the crucial issue of increasing the age of marriage to 18, demonstrating our commitment to protecting children's rights on both national and international stages.

Further work

Together continued to engage with international networks and share learning from Scotland's experiences in promoting children's rights.





What did we do?

Strategic Plan 2024-32


Together launched its new Strategic Plan 2024-32 in March 2024, following extensive engagement with members and reflecting on children and young people's input. This plan sets out three strategic priorities focusing on proactive measures, responsive actions, and building the strength of the children's rights community. The new Strategic Plan was launched at a parliamentary event on 26th March 2024, bringing together children, young people, and key stakeholders to celebrate this important milestone.

Funding successes

We secured substantial new funding, including almost £40,000 from Cattanach to lead the Rights of the Child UK project and a further award of over £100,000 per annum for five years to support early years-focused, rights-based work. These funding successes will allow us to expand our impact and reach. Together also raised £1,917 through participation in the Kiltwalk in September 2023, demonstrating innovative approaches to fundraising.

Organisational review and development

In early 2024, we commenced a comprehensive role and remuneration review to ensure all role descriptions accurately reflect staff responsibilities and skills. This process, involving both staff and trustees, aims to identify any skills gaps and consider whether further recruitment is needed.



What did we do?

Partnership and internship

We continued to benefit from our partnerships with universities, welcoming Isobel Mintz as a work-based placement student in May 2023 (University of Edinburgh) and Gift Ayodele as a work-based placement student in September 2023 (University of Stirling). Gift was later recruited as our Communications Intern in November 2023. We continue planning for future LLM and MA candidate placements. These collaborations not only enhance our capacity but also help to engage students in children's rights work.

Membership structure and growth

We implemented a new tiered membership fee in April 2023, creating an equitable fee structure while generating much-needed additional revenue for Together. This change reflects our commitment to financial sustainability and inclusivity within our membership.

Together's membership grew from 540 in March 2023 to 600 in March 2024, reflecting the organisation's increasing influence and the value it provides to members. Throughout the year, we featured 23 member organisations in our "Membership Spotlight," showcasing the diverse range of organisations working to promote children's rights in Scotland.

Board of Trustees

Together's Board of Trustees oversees Together's work to ensure we meet OSCR requirements. Throughout the year, staff and the Together Board continued to draft, implement and improve organisational policies and procedures to ensure best practice in the day-to-day and overall governance of the charity are followed.

Three new trustees were elected at the 2023 AGM: Martin Canavan, Katrina Lambert and Maria Galli. Mary Glasgow was re-elected as Chair, Susan Hunter as Vice-Chair and Mairi McReynolds as Treasurer. The Board brings a range of skills and expertise, offering valuable strategic oversight to the organisation.

Board meetings are held once a quarter, and subgroups have been established to help focus expertise on certain issues. The Finance sub-group led by the Treasurer met regularly to oversee the production of the monthly management accounts and propose budgetary and spending decisions to the Board of Trustees. An Executive subgroup of office-bearers met regularly to streamline Board decision-making. An Operations subgroup led by a Trustee oversees operational issues including policies and procedures and staffing.

Almost 17% of respondents to our 2023 Membership Survey said they would consider or possibly consider running to become a Trustee on Together's Board. This a decrease on previous years (in comparison to 29% in 2022) and needs further examination so Together can put a clear strategy in place to ensure members feel able to bring their skills to support the governance of the organisation.

Lobbying register

Together has ensured that all regulated lobbying activities are registered in the appropriate manner and that new staff understand the procedures before attending events where they may become involved in such activities.

Staff team changes

Together has largely retained the same staff team between April 2023 and March 2024:

- In May 2023 Caitlin Forrest was promoted from her full-time role as
 Membership and Events Assistant to become Together's Membership, Events
 and Communications Officer in recognition of the increased responsibilities
 of her role.
- In September 2023 Judi Martin left her part-time role as Communications Intern to become Together's full-time Policy Assistant.
- In November 2023 the part-time role of Communications Intern was subsequently filled by Gift Ayodele.

Over summer 2023, Together also benefitted from the work of Isobel Mintz as a placement student as part of her LLM in Human Rights at the University of Edinburgh. Isobel published her research on children's participation in the UNCRC monitoring process in November 2023, which went on to inform how Together would be able to work best with its membership in engaging babies, children and young people, informing Together's strategic plan 2024-32. In September 2023, Gift Ayodele commenced her placement with Together as an MSc student at University of Stirling.

Together continued to benefit from the services of Jacqui Dunbar, Participation Consultant, which was made possible by funding from Scottish Government for the Rights Detectives project.

Together continued to benefit from the contribution of Ian Douglas, voluntary accountant.

Financial highlights


Total income for the year was £371,920, an increase from £290,952 in the previous year.

Expenditure on charitable activities increased to £350,879 from £288,847 in the previous year, reflecting our expanded activities.

Together ended the year with a strong financial position, with total funds carried forward of £94,928, up from £73,936 in the previous year.

Further work

- Continued to strengthen ties with universities to engage students on children's rights.
- Regularly featured member organisations in "Membership Spotlight" articles, promoting the work of our diverse membership base.





What have our members said?

Our 2023 membership survey revealed that 100% of respondents felt our communications struck a 'good balance', neither overwhelming nor insufficient. Members also unanimously agreed that our organisational values and strategic aims were appropriate for Together.

The survey highlighted some areas for potential growth. While 78% of members felt confident about where to find information on children's rights related to their specific area of work, 22% were less sure. This suggests an opportunity for Together to further tailor its resources to meet specific sector needs.

The survey also revealed that the biggest barrier to organisations using children's rights was a lack of capacity and time (61% of respondents), followed by the complex legal framework (50%). This information can guide Together's future efforts in supporting members to overcome these challenges.

It is registered as a charity with the Office of the Scottish Charity Regulator. In 2022, a resolution was passed to convert Together's status to a Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation (SCIO). Together became a SCIO on 23rd May 2023.



Appointment of trustees

The Trustees are elected or reelected by the members at the Annual General Meeting. The number of Trustees shall not exceed 10 persons. All Trustees are appointed for an initial 3-year term after which they can be re-elected for a further 3 years. The Trustees hold regular board meetings and monitor the financial situation of the Charity closely. None of the Trustees receive remuneration or other benefit from their work with the Charity.

Reserves policy

To avoid closure if funding difficulties were to happen the Board has agreed to maintain unrestricted reserves at a level of at least three months essential operating costs, which would allow staff to continue working, primarily to secure new funding or to be able to safely manage exit costs. The Board can decide to increase this amount as needed, for example to ensure financial stability in times of uncertainty such as the COVID-19 pandemic.






Risk management

A comprehensive Risk Register has been created and forms a standing item for the Board of Trustees.

Internal risks are minimised by the implementation of policies and procedures for authorisation of all transactions and projects and to ensure consistent quality of delivery for all operational aspects of Together's work. These policies and procedures are periodically reviewed to ensure that they still meet Together's needs. The key risks identified and associated mitigating actions are:



To ensure Together is able to fund its core objectives and work programmes, the Trustees keep funding under review with quarterly updates and scenario planning. Trustees conduct a regular review of the reserves policy. The Director maintains ongoing contact with existing and potential funders.

To ensure adequate financial controls, budgeting and scenario planning, funding strategy, reserves policy and financial reporting, the Trustees scrutinise income/expenditure against budget on a quarterly basis with ongoing oversight by the Finance Subgroup. The Treasurer works with the Finance Subgroup to apply financial controls and ensure an annual independent financial examination.



Good governance structures and boards:

Trustees are attentive to relevant communications and scrutinise all Board papers. Board meetings are held quarterly with accurate information provided by Together's Director to inform quality decision making. The Executive and Finance Subgroups meet 3 monthly at a minimum with at least one Trustee Office Holder (Chair, Vice Chair and Treasurer) in attendance at every meeting. Trustees tasked with supporting the development of policies and procedures in relation to governance, finance and human resources and monitors risk on an ongoing basis. A part-time Business Operations Manager supports the Trustees and Director with governance needs.



Staff retention and recruitment:

Trustees take a range of actions to promote the retention of key staff. In 2023-24, Together engaged the services of a Human Resources Policy Consultancy to ensure employment practices meet or exceed statutory requirements. Within the staff team, there are regular check-ins and 1-1s between staff and Director with relevant issues explored. The Trustees conduct a three-monthly Staff Wellbeing Survey to identify any pressing concerns or issues. Pay, remuneration and pension policy is reviewed by Trustees annually and the remuneration package is deemed competitive. Every step is taken to ensure that training and support meets the needs of the role.

Responsibilities of the Trustees

The Charity Trustees (who are Directors of the Scottish Alliance for Children's Rights for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing a trustees' Annual Report and Financial Statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice). Company law requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial period that give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company at the balance sheet date and of its incoming resources and application of resources, including income and expenditure, for the financial period. In preparing those financial statements, the Trustees should follow best practice and:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable UK accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the Financial Statements;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to assume that the company will continue on that basis.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and the group and hence taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities. The Trustees are responsible for the maintenance and integrity of the corporate and financial information included on the charitable company's website. Legislation in the United Kingdom governing the preparation and dissemination of financial statements may differ from legislation in other jurisdictions.

Accounting policies

The principal accounting policies adopted, judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows:

2 Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities published on 16th July 2014, the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective January 2015) and the Companies Act 2006. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note(s).

Preparation of the accounts on an ongoing concern basis

The Trustees have prepared these financial statements on the assessment that Together (Scottish Alliance for Children's Rights) is an ongoing concern. There are no material uncertainties of which the trustees are aware that ought to be disclosed in relation to this assessment.

Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the bank.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available to spend on activities that further any of the purposes of the charity. Restricted funds are donations which the donor has specified are to be solely used for particular areas of Together's (Scottish Alliance for Children's Rights) work.

Expenditure and irrecoverable VAT

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to make a payment to a third party. It is probable that settlement will be required, and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified under the following activity headings:

Costs of raising funds comprise the costs of staff time involved in applying for grants from statutory and trust funding sources, as well as meeting the monitoring and reporting requirements in relation to funds secured.

- Expenditure on charitable activities includes the costs of all activities undertaken by Together (Scottish Alliance for Children's Rights) which promote the UN Convention on the Rights of Child and monitor its implementation across Scotland, including policy, membership and events and their associated support costs.
- Other expenditure represents those items not falling into any other heading.
- Irrecoverable VAT is charged as a cost against the activity for which the expenditure was incurred.

7 Support costs

Support costs are those functions that assist the work of the charity but do not directly undertake charitable activities. Support costs include some finance, personnel (including volunteers) and payroll costs which support Together (Scottish Alliance for Children's Rights) overall activities. Support costs have been detailed in note 15.

8 Debtors

Debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any discount offered.

—9 Cash in bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes petty cash and the cash balance of Together's deposit bank account.

10 Creditors

Creditors are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will result in a transfer of funds to a third party, and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors are normally recognised at their settlement amount allowing for any discounts due.



11 Pensions

Together (Scottish Alliance for Children's Rights) had a staging date of 1st February 2017 to meet the automatic enrolment requirements of the Pensions Act 2008. The Finance Subgroup, with agreement of the Board of Trustees, has opted to use NEST (National Employment Savings Trust) as its automatic enrolment pension provider. A defined contribution scheme with NEST has been in place from 1st February 2017 and is open to all staff. The NEST pension scheme operates in line with Government legislation and employer contributions will match at least the minimum levels stipulated by the Government. During the employee's term of employment, Together (Scottish Alliance for Children's Rights) will contribute 6% of basic salary each month to the NEST pension or other qualifying pension scheme that the employee may have.

12 Legal status of charity

Together (Scottish Alliance for Children's Rights) is a Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation (SCIO) and has no share capital. The liability of each member in the event of winding-up is limited to £1.
