

A children's human rights approach

What makes the right environment for an effective children's human rights approach

The following resource was co-produced with families using their direct lived experience to bridge the gap between children's rights theory and practice. The families shared their experiences of what makes the right environment for a good children's human rights approach and gave examples of things that had previously made them feel comfortable enough to share their views with workers.

- Warm lighting, LED lights and lava lamps to brighten up the room.
- Cosy and warm.
- Stickers on ceiling.
- Pictures and posters to look at.
- Windows to see outside.
- Space for quiet time/chill out.
- Plants/nature feels nice.
- Comfy seats.
- Bright colours.
- Clean, warm colours.
- Correct size table and chairs for children.
- Being outside is sometimes good.
- Big, open space.
- Nice atmosphere.
